“ I have known Joe Gamble my entire life. We grew up together on Bagley Street in Pontiac Michigan. Joe was the youngest child of Edith "Tiny" Jones Gamble and William Gamble. I first met Joe in my grandmothers beauty shop on Bagley street where his mother would get her hair done.

While growing up Joe was one of my best friends. He was like a big brother to me. Joe spent more time at our house than he spent at his own. He would come to our house and raid the refrigerator and we would go to his house and do the same. We used to make mud pies together as children. We attended Bagley Elementary School, We were members of the same Boy Scout troop (Troup 22). We would camp out in the woods, make camp fires and sleep outside in our tents. We were both members of the band, we both played Saxophone (Joe also played Clarinet). Joe was the reason that I started playing saxophone. Joe was an excellent musician and teacher. Jazz improvisation was is forte. No one at our school could improvise as well as Joe. He would say, "you can do it too, all you have to do is practice." He got all of us interested in Jazz. Joe came from a very musically talented family. His brother Henry was one of the best flute players in Pontiac. His uncles Elvin Jones, Thad Jones and Hank Jones were three of the most famous Jazz musicians on the Planet. Joe definitely inherited their musical talent.

I can remember being in elementary school and my grandfather (Rev Dan Jones) and grandmother Adline Jones, dragging all of us, including Joe, to churches all over Michigan. I remember going to Church in Battle Creek Michigan one Sunday and letting Joe talk us into playing Jazz instrumentals by Les McCann and Eddie Harris instead of church songs...and we did it.

After I left Pontiac to study and practice medicine, I lost track of Joe for a long time. About 3 yrs ago we reunited. Joe told me how proud he was of his children and his wife, and how much he loved them. We would reminisce about old times. Joe talked about his numerous health problems

including hypertension, diabetes, peripheral vascular disease, peripheral neuropathy, leg amputation, chronic pain, renal failure, kidney transplant anti rejection medications...but he wouldn't let any of that get him down. Joe was optimistic until the end. He was optimistic his entire life. His optimism was infectious.

May God keep your soul for all eternity. May God continue to bless your entire family.
