Madeline Walker finished her education at Oakland Community College where she received a degree in Life Skills. Madeline Walker was an extraordinary woman with multiple gifts and talents. She is the founder and President of the "Walker Works Organization." An organization which guided the youth of Pontiac it also showed them work ethics, crafting, cooking skills, gardening skills, baking and selling of their own products. It showed them responsibility, hard work and owning and operating your own business it also gave them a place to be safe and learn not only about hard work but about themselves.

Mrs. Walker received multiple awards including an award from the Mayor of Pontiac for her work in the community. She also received an award from the State of Michigan for her work as a Private Adult Foster Care Provider and her work with the elderly. She owned and operated one of the first adult foster care homes. She was a pillar of the community and a role model to many.

Mrs. Walker enjoyed playing solitaire and bid whist with family and friends and baking especially her sweet potato pies. She enjoyed watching sports especially her Detroit Tigers, Detroit Lions and Detroit Pistons. She wrote poetry and also hosted poetry readings and fashion shows. She enjoyed gardening and she mostly enjoyed family gatherings and dinners.
